<p>Project Summary: The Grace House is a recovery housing facility for pregnant and postpartum women (PPW) that requires additional funding for the purchase of a new building to expand this program. Initially, Franklin County requested FY 2025 carryforward approval for repairs to operationalize a set of outdoor stairs leading to the second floor of the building for access to the second floor of the Grace House. The initial intent was to facilitate the development of two additional independent living spaces for pregnant and postpartum women in recovery to be located on the second floor of the Grace House. However, upon receipt of the project architect's estimated cost for the original renovation project, Franklin County has indicated it would be better to purchase a new property, which would be more cost-effective. Through Franklin County's partnership with the Piedmont Community Services Board, the addition of a new building will allow for three additional apartment units (rooms) for pregnant and postpartum women in recovery. The program is currently a 6-12-month program with five existing living units, and the addition three living units would be made available and yield a 60% increase in the program's capacity. Franklin County has pledged \$138,920 of Direct Distribution (non-OAA) matching funds to support this effort.</p>

<p>Project Summary: The substance use disorder intensive case manager will provide intensive case management services to reduce substance abuse/use in families and children. This position will reduce SUD related child abuse/neglect and SUD among children. The program will also strengthen families and increase local and regional collaborations for services. Clarke County has pledged \$31,514 of direct distribution and McKinsey Settlement (non-OAA) combined matching funds to support this effort.</p>						
<p>Evidence-Informed Practice: <i>Nurturing Parent – Families in Substance Abuse Treatment and Recovery</i> – this is a program they will implement based on principles of relational development. <i>Families in Substance Abuse Treatment and Recovery</i> has 17 topic areas presented in the program, in addition to three topics focused on men and fathers. Each topic area represents a group-based session of 90 minutes. However, due to the number of activities and the depth of the information presented in each topic area, more than one session may be helpful to adequately increase parents' knowledge and build their skills.</p>

<p>Project Summary: This project aims to implement a proof-of-concept initiative through the development of an AI-enabled virtual reality (VR) training platform for multidisciplinary crisis response teams. In partnership with George Mason University's College of Public Health and Immersion Technology Lab, Fairfax City will implement Phase 1 of the Community Opioid Response Enrichment (CORE) project. CORE will enhance core competencies, coordination, and role-specific expertise among crisis responders during opioid-related crisis and post-crisis events through immersive, scenario-based VR training accessible both on-site and remotely. A key component of this project consists of strengthening the integration and effective utilization of certified peer recovery specialists within local crisis response systems, improving outcomes for individuals and communities impacted by opioid use disorder.</p>						
<p>Evidence-Based or Evidence-Informed Practice: GMU College of Public Health – <i>Immersive Technology a proven teaching tool</i>.</p>						
<p>Project Specific Contingencies: Written agreement between the fiscal agent (Fairfax City) and each subrecipient (Chris Atwood Foundation, and George Mason University) detailing budget, scope, performance measures, expectations, etc. before the OAA will transfer awarded funds. <u>Community Paramedicine Program</u>	1	\$58,800	\$14,700	\$73,500	\$73,500
<p>Project Summary: This project is a targeted initiative designed to bridge gaps in healthcare access, reduce avoidable emergency department utilization, and improve long-term outcomes for vulnerable populations. Initially launched with funding from the Virginia Department of Health, the program operated for a limited period before being paused due to federal budget reductions. With OAA funding, the program is positioned for relaunch and expansion with a focused emphasis on opioid use disorder (OUD) services while also addressing broader Community Risk Reduction (CRR) priorities. The program will be administered by the Franklin County Public Safety Department and implemented through a phased approach, with expansion to full fiscal-year operations in subsequent phases. The program will directly benefit residents who utilize emergency services for substance-use related incidents, including approximately 150 opioid-related 911 calls received annually, while also providing prevention, treatment linkage, and education for individuals experiencing non-opioid substance use emergencies. Franklin County has pledged \$23,750 of direct distribution (non-OAA) matching funds to support this effort. Only 50% of the personnel costs are part of this OAA project to ensure a separate pay source for time spent on non-abatement activities.</p>					
<p>Evidence-Informed Practice: This project's design intentionally incorporates key components that have been informed by empirical evidence, state guidance, and demonstrated effectiveness in practice across the Commonwealth and nationally. Community paramedicine, mobile integrated healthcare (MIH), and post-overdose outreach models are actively used by multiple Virginia localities and have informed statewide EMS and public health guidance. Documented outcomes include: reductions in repeat 911 utilization among high-risk individuals, improved engagement with Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT), expanded naloxone distribution and overdose education, improved continuity of care for individuals with opioid use disorder (OUD), and reduced strain on EMS and emergency department resources.</p>

<p>Project Summary: This project will consist of Henrico County contracting with an organization to provide substance use education for up to 20 faith-based leaders from a cross section of faiths. The contracted provider will work up to a year to ensure that faith leaders have a good understanding of substance use, and ways to address substance use in their communities, as well as link individuals affected to the treatment and supports they need. Faith leaders will have the opportunity to meet prevention, treatment, recovery, and harm reduction providers in their communities. Leaders will work together to develop and implement strategies to reduce substance use and overdoses in their congregations. In-person training will be provided to assist the faith leaders with developing a project for engaging their community on the topic of substance use and recovery. Henrico County expects that 20 faith-based leaders will participate in this effort, benefitting 5,000+ individuals. The faith-based communities may include the following: Jewish, Muslim, Buddhist, Hindu, and Christian communities.</p>					
<p>Evidence-Based or Evidence-Informed Practice: <u>Clinton Foundation – Empowering Faith Leaders to Address the Addiction and Overdose Crisis</u>. Data from this program includes a 50% increase in knowledge of specific treatment organizations and other supportive resources, increased skills in connecting individuals to treatment and recovery resources, and an increase in collaboration and partnership with other organizations to expand the reach and impact of work to address the overdose crisis.</p>					
<p>Project Specific Contingencies: Written agreement between the fiscal agent (Henrico County) and the subrecipient (TBD) detailing budget, scope, performance measures, expectations, etc. before the OAA will transfer awarded funds. This can be in the form of a contract, MOU, or other written mechanism. <u>PCS – Justice Support and Recovery Court Services</u>	1	\$15,156	\$3,789	\$18,945	\$18,945
<p>Project Summary: Following a 2024 needs assessment conducted by the OMNI Institute, Patrick County identified critical gaps in substance use disorder (SUD) services, particularly for justice-involved and incarcerated individuals. In partnership with Piedmont Community Services, the region's Community Services Board, Patrick County seeks funding to enhance services for the Piedmont Adult Recovery Court and to expand mental health and SUD treatment within the Patrick County Jail. Funds will support a Peer Support Specialist, Psychiatric Mental Health Nurse Practitioner, licensed therapist, Justice Support Supervisor, and the purchase of an SUV to address transportation barriers and operating needs. The Peer Support Specialist will provide dedicated services to Adult Recovery Court participants, while the Nurse Practitioner and therapist will deliver psychiatric medication management and individual and group therapy to incarcerated individuals. The Justice Support Supervisor will oversee service delivery within the jail setting. Adult Recovery Court serves up to 25 participants at a time with an anticipated eight graduates annually, while the Nurse Practitioner and therapist will support up to 50 and 60 individuals per year, respectively. Through this coordinated approach, Patrick County aims to expand access to treatment, improve recovery outcomes, and reduce recidivism among justice-involved individuals. Patrick County has pledged \$145,211 of direct distribution (non-OAA) matching funds to support this effort.</p>					
<p>Evidence-Based or Evidence-Informed Practice: <u>All Rise Treatment Court Best Practices Standards</u> represent over two decades of research on treatment courts, criminology, and behavioral health. The standards distill this research into actionable best practices, providing a comprehensive blueprint to enhance outcomes across all treatment court models. All Rise maintains a rigorous peer review process involving treatment court practitioners, researchers, and other subject-matter experts. Adult drug courts are an alternative to incarceration that combine public health and public safety approaches to connect people involved in the justice system with individualized, evidence-based treatment and recovery support services.</p>
